December Pastoral Letter from the Vicar

What on earth are you waiting for?

For Christians, one word recaptures the essence of Advent: we are waiting. But that word presents us with a problem. How many of us, honestly, are waiting? And if we are, what exactly are we waiting for?

Plenty of people say, "I just can't wait for Christmas to come," and for all sorts of good reasons: the return of loved ones long absent, a welcome break from classroom tyranny, a new computer game, that outfit in the shop window, Christmas carols and all their charm, or the annual battle on the north face of the Christmas turkey. Good reasons indeed.

But how many of us find ourselves saying, "I just can't wait for Christ to come"?

Here lies the difficulty: why should we wait for Christ to come at all? Why wait for someone who has already come, someone we already have, someone who is actually here? Christ came one midnight clear, wrapped in the swaddling bands of a child. And when he left us, paradoxically he remained with us. He took from us the physical charm of his presence – the face his mother knew so well, the voice that was music to the ears of his friends. And still he is here, now.

So what exactly are we waiting for? His final coming on a pink cloud, separating saved sheep from damned goats? If so, you might not want to hold your breath.

If there is no Christ to wait for, it is little wonder that Advent means so little to the average Christian, let alone to anyone else, and plays second fiddle to the advertisements urging us to buy, buy. I am not saying we shouldn't celebrate the first Christmas, remembering it lovingly and reliving it each year in our worship. I am asking whether waiting for Christ makes any sense when he surrounds us and rests within us. Is our waiting mere pretending – playacting, holy make-believe?

Then there is the human experience of waiting – both joyful and painful. What was it like for Mary to wait for Jesus? As a man I can only imagine; only mothers truly know. Jesus was there, and yet not quite there – not in the way she longed for, not as he would be in a stable a hundred miles away. In the meantime there was the paradox of pregnancy: years of joy offset by days of discomfort, anxiety and fear, and sleepless nights. Those sleepless nights I do know something about!

And then came that night – amid the dung and dust of a Palestinian stable – when Jesus was born of her. He came to light, came from her to her. Of course, he was hers before, but what a difference one night makes. This was what Mary had been waiting for; here Jesus became real, enfleshed, in a way he had never been before.

So what does all this say about our Advent? It tells us that we do not wait for Christ to move toward us; we wait for Christ to come alive within us. The real question is: how alive is he for you? If Christ is thrillingly alive for you, if he is as real and breathing a presence as your nearest and dearest, close this magazine and go and do something more worthwhile.

But if Christ within you is still an embryo, if you have not felt him move or been startled by his gentle kicking, if you do not embrace him as a friend, then perhaps his birth in you is long overdue. If Christ is someone you 'soak up' on Sundays because the ritual is familiar, while the rest of the week is Christ-less (not sinful, just Christ-less), then these next twenty days may be demanding ones.

What did Mary do when the angel left her? "Mary arose and went with haste into the hill country" – to the home of Elizabeth, who needed her help. Here our own Christmas frenzy might actually help us. Every shop window and colourful commercial urges us to give. What we must rediscover is that the best gift is always symbolic – regnant with meaning that money cannot buy. A gift is most perfect when it stands for the giver, when in the giving I offer something of myself.

Like Mary, we must activate our waiting. Give yourself. Bring Christ to your neighbour, especially to those who resemble him only because they seem pinned to a cross. If, like Mary, you carry Christ to someone who needs your care, the effect can be quietly transforming.

This kind of Advent is not easy. Twenty-odd shopping days to Christmas; twenty or so days to shop for Christ – for a living, breathing Christ. It might feel too short if we had to travel to Bethlehem or Calvary, or Ukraine.

But the good news for Advent shoppers is that the risen Christ has been seen here. In fact, you can find him anywhere in Northampton, on any face – if you want to, and if you have eyes to see.

This is our calling – to live lives that burn brightly with the love of Jesus and to work together to bring hope.

My prayer for you, is that you will know the light of Jesus in your own lives this Christmas and that you will experience that joy that comes from welcoming the Son of God into our lives.

The main event was a resounding success, with a blazing fire burning throughout (the embers were still warm the next morning), and spectacular fireworks display. Regrettably, although many saw the funny side, the fire brigade turned up part way through after having received a false report that a tree in the church grounds was on fire. Fortunately, the fireman in charge of the watch saw that the event was well organised and safe, and after a quick inspection of the premises the fire engine trundled off down The Drive. After the excitement of the fire and fireworks, everyone went into the Parish Centre for a hearty meal, which was traditional Guy Fawkes night fare.









Many thanks to those who helped organise this very successful community event, notably Andrew Geary, Ian Parker, Adam Setterfield and Dave Wilson who helped dig the fire pit, and Heidi Moore and Kay Warçaba who laid on a true feast for a hungry throng of around 65 people. Special mention goes to Andrew Geary who helped me fill the fire pit in a few days later. That's a job that is at best unattractive and is very hard physical work!

Thanks to everyone who supported this event in any way, which was a fundraiser for the Friends of St Matthew's Music. It's great to stage these events which bring so many people together for fun, food and fellowship.

The History of The Friends of St Matthew's Music

Never take anything for granted. I assumed that most members of the Parish were aware of the origins of The Friends. But given that Basil and I initiated its founding in the late 1980s, it is hardly surprising that its origins have been lost and confused. So to put the record straight I am detailing exactly how in 1987 the **Friends of St Matthew's Choir** was born which eventually evolved into the **Friends of St Matthew's Music** which we know today.

When Basil and I came to live in Northampton we were told about St Matthew's, its Anglican tradition and excellent support for the arts, particularly **music**. At our first service we were amazed as the Clergy and Choir processed from the vestry. What a joy to hear Sung Eucharist within a Parish Church when we had previously only heard such quality when visiting Cathedrals. We were captured, quickly becoming involved in the life of St Matthew's. At the time we were newly married and developing our careers in Education.

As the years went by our family grew and when our sons were old enough, one by one they exchanged Sunday School for the Choir stalls. At the time the Choir of men and boys (all recruited from local schools) had to make a big commitment. The boys rehearsed three times a week as well as singing at Weddings on Saturdays and twice on Sundays. There were weekday festivals too. We were fortunate because we only had sons but there were boys with sisters whose parents had far more difficulty dividing their time.

By the early 1980s the glory days of St Matthew's Choir were diminishing. Michael Nicholas had become Director of Music at Norwich. His successor Stephen Cleobury left for Westminster Cathedral and then moved onto Kings

College Cambridge leaving a choir without an effective successor. At the same time recruitment of boy trebles was becoming more difficult as Northampton having abolished the 11+, adopted the Comprehensive System of Education and as a result, the shared Music post with the Boys School was lost. Our boys were infants at this stage attending Sunday School and along with other members of the congregation we wondered how the Choir would progress.

The Vicar Fr John Morton had a brainwave and invited Derek Gillard, a local teacher with a background of Choral singing from Guilford Cathedral, to take up the position of Director of Music as he had formed a successful boys choir at St John the Baptist Church Kingsthorpe. This was transformative. Derek had both the choral background and credibility with local boys. He arrived in leathers on his motorbike and like a Pied Piper he was able to bring local boys into the choir who stayed and developed into committed choristers.

By the mid-1980s all three of our sons were part of this band of choristers attending choir practices, workshops in the holidays and Cathedral tours in the summer. It became a way of life for us with Basil and I regularly helping to ferry our sons and other boys backwards and forwards to these events.

Whilst all three of our sons sang, it was Daniel our middle son who shone and we had to resist pressure not to send him to Cathedral Choir School. Derek Gillard therefore suggested Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) courses for him to attend, and the rest is history. From these RSCM courses Daniel was selected to sing with the Southern Cathedral Singers. On Saturdays and in the holidays boys from a variety of Churches sang Evensong in Cathedrals in the South of England. So our family life was further dominated by driving to these events. We viewed it as a family day out, although I suspect Jonathan and Timothy would have preferred other activities (the latter eventually was also recruited). Whilst the Choir was rehearsing we would be exploring Cathedrals etc and it was here that we picked up leaflets for Friends of various Choirs. It was demanding on our time and finances. Canon Met Clarke (retired former curate of St Matthew's during Hussey's time and now returned to worship with us once again) asked us who was meeting the cost. We were fortunate to enjoy it and to be able to give our sons this opportunity. But there were other boys less fortunate. The Head Chorister at the time had a very good voice, but he was the only son of a single mother. To this end when Daniel won Choir Boy of the Year in 1986 winning £2000 for the Church, we approached the Vicar Fr John Morton and the then Director of Music Andrew Shenton about setting up a Friends Association initially to support other boys.

The inaugural meeting took place at our house, attended by over 25 enthusiasts. A draft constitution was approved and a bank balance set up.

The Friends of St Matthew's Choir was established and began to attract some young musicians. The brief was quickly extended to include Organ Scholars and for a period of time music at St Matthew's was more secure. But funding such an enterprise is always demanding, and in time it became imperative to find other means of raising money. Whilst the PCC has the responsibility of funding the Director of Music's salary, it became increasingly difficult to offer scholarships to young organists and choristers. It was therefore agreed to set up 100 club to attract more support. This worked for a while, but in time this alone could not meet requirements. The brief had to change to embrace a wider audience. The Friends of St Matthew's Choir became The Friends of St Matthew's Music with a new constitution.

Throughout this time a number of Directors of Music have been employed, bringing varied skills of musicianship to the role whilst dealing with high expectations on limited funding. Young musicians have been given opportunities establishing the tradition of support Basil and I wanted for others. Whilst St Matthew's proudly celebrates the compositions of famous composers of the past (Britten, Finzi, Tippett, Arnold et al) who have greatly enhanced our musical reputation, today we must adapt to enable wider talents (not least females) to benefit from our musical heritage. To date our present Director of Music Tom Moore is a musician who understands the demands of providing music in a Parish Church. He is successfully fulfilling the brief so that St Matthew's Choir is now not only part of parochial life but is reaching out to the wider community and as our present Vicar Fr Nicholas Setterfield also champions this musical heritage, it is imperative that as a congregation we continue to support the endeavours of **The Friends of St Matthew's Music** to secure the future.

Café Guides Recipe for December

Turkey Roulades with Pork, Sage and Onion Stuffing

This recipe is for those who want to enjoy all the traditional flavours of Christmas without having to go through the whole turkey-cooking marathon. 35 mins - 40 mins to cook *Ingredients*

For the turkey:

- 4 x 6 oz (175g) turkey breast escalopes
- 14 oz (400g) smoked rashers streaky bacon, de-rinded (16 rashers)

For the stuffing:

- 12oz (350g) pork sausage meat
- ½ oz (10g) chopped fresh sage
- 1 small onion, very finely chopped
- 1 oz (25g) fresh white breadcrumbs

For the gravy:

- 1 dessertspoon plain flour
- 5fl oz (150ml) dry white wine
- 5fl oz (150ml) chicken stock
- salt and freshly milled black pepper

Method

- 1. First of all, take the turkey escalopes and place them one at a time between two pieces of clingfilm.
- 2. Take a rolling pin and gently roll each escalope so it measures about 9 inches (23cm) long by 4 inches (10cm) wide and ¼ inch (5mm) thick. It does not matter if these measurements are not perfect! Next, mix the stuffing ingredients together. Then, take one of the flattened escalopes and a quarter of the stuffing and roll it into a sausage the same length as the escalope (dampen your hands with water if the stuffing is sticky) and place the sausage-shaped stuffing 1 inch (2.5cm) from one side of the length and carefully roll the turkey around the stuffing.
- 3. Repeat with the other escalopes. Then, taking one rasher of bacon, wrap it round one of the roulades, starting at one end, overlapping it slightly until the roulade is completely wrapped. Then do the same with the other 3 rashers you need 4 for each roulade. Repeat with the other 3 roulades. Cover and chill for a minimum of 2 hours.

- 4. When you are ready to cook the turkey, preheat the oven to gas mark 6/200°C. Place the 4 roulades, well apart, in the greased roasting tin and roast on the middle shelf of the oven for 35-40 minutes or until crispy and firm to the touch. Remove the roulades from the tin and then cover them with a sheet of foil to keep warm.
- 5. To make the gravy, place the roasting tin over direct heat turned to fairly low, and when the juices begin to sizzle, sprinkle in the plain flour, stirring vigorously with a wooden spoon till you get a smooth paste. Then mix the wine with the stock and add it, little by little, exchanging the wooden spoon for a whisk. Whisk thoroughly until the stock and wine are incorporated and bring it to simmering point, then let it bubble and reduce for about 5 minutes. Then taste and season with salt and freshly milled black pepper and pour into a warmed serving jug.
- 6. To serve, slice each roulade diagonally into 3 or 4 pieces and place on a warm serving dish. Serve with cranberry sauce and bread sauce



Bonus Recipe! Perfect to serve with the turkey on the previous page

Parisienne Potatoes

Ingredients

- 800g waxy potatoes (such as Maris Piper or Yukon Gold)
- 2 tbsp unsalted butter (melted)
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 tsp salt
- ½ tsp black pepper
- 1 tsp garlic powder (optional)
- 1 tsp dried thyme or rosemary
- Fresh parsley (chopped, for garnish)

Method

- 1. Preheat your oven to 200°C (180°C fan) or 400°F. Line a baking tray with parchment paper.
- Peel the potatoes and use a melon baller to scoop out small, evensized potato balls. Place the potato balls in a bowl of cold water to remove excess starch.
- 3. Drain the potatoes and pat them dry with a paper towel.
- 4. In a large bowl, toss the potatoes with melted butter, olive oil, salt, black pepper, garlic powder, and thyme until evenly coated.
- 5. Spread the potatoes in a single layer on the prepared baking tray. Roast in the preheated oven for 30-35 minutes, shaking the tray half-way through for even browning.
- 6. Once golden and crispy, remove from the oven and sprinkle with fresh parsley.

Parish Giving Scheme

The Parish Giving Scheme exists to allow members of the St Matthew's community to support the life and work of the Parish, and the upkeep of our church, through regular giving. It provides our principal source of income and helps us meet our main financial commitments, including our contribution towards the Diocesan Common Fund (the 'Parish Share') and the costs of our employees.



The Scheme is the most tax efficient way of contributing to the church because contributions may be eligible for Gift Aid (raising your donation by 25% at no cost to either you or St Matthew's).

There are two methods of payment available: by a banker's direct debit or by weekly-numbered envelopes via the collection plate. The amount that you give is entirely confidential and is known only to the lay people who administer the Scheme.
